Get Instant Messages from Ashville & nixle



The Village of Ashville will utilize a new communications service, effective July 1, 2011, that allows us to send important, valuable community information directly to residents using the latest technology.

The Nixle Community Information Service allows us to create and publish messages to be delivered to registered residents instantly via cell phone text message and/or email. Notifications will also be accessed online at Nixle's web site at www.nixle.com.

The type of message will include Tornado Watch, Flood Watch, and Water Main Break, Road Closure as well as other relevant safety and community event information. Mayor Wise states, "This is one more way to reach our residents quickly, in addition to our website and the news media".

The service is reliable and free for our community to use. The messages can be sent

specifically to residents registered within a ¼ mile radius, giving them the opportunity to receive trustworthy information relevant to their neighborhood. Residents decide from which local agencies they want to receive information. Subscribers can also choose the way in which alerts are received, whether it is by email, text message, or over the web.

There is NO spam and no hidden cost by Nixle or Ashville. Standard text messaging rates do apply.

Nixle builds on the foundations of other public-to-public communication services, such as Twitter, Facebook, and MySpace, but adds a key component: security. When citizens receive information from our agency via Nixle, they know it can be trusted.

"Nixle is a first-of-its-kind tool for communities that need to provide critical information to their residents," said Craig Mitnick, Founder and CEO. "In today's world, you have to trust the source of your information. Residents of Ashville can rest easy that the local messages they receive are authentic."

communities after July 1st will begin receiving pertinent information via text message, email, and web by registering at www.nixle.com.

Nixle is a community information service provider built exclusively to provide secure and reliable communications. It is the first authenticated and secure service that connects municipal agencies and community organizations to residents in real time, delivering information to geographically targeted consumers over their cell phones (via text messages), through e-mails and via Web access. Nixle has secured a partnership with Nlets (the International Justice and Public Safety Network), allowing local police departments nationwide to send immediate alerts and advisories. Privately funded Nixle, which has offices in New Jersey and California, is free to all governments, their agencies and organizations, non-governmental organizations and consumers. 



Relevant Ordinance

509.08 DISTURBING THE PEACE.

(a) Prohibition. No person shall make, continue or cause to be made or continued any loud, unnecessary or unusual noise or any noise which either annoys, disturbs, injures or endangers the comfort, repose, health, peace or safety of others, within the limits of the Village.

(b) Noises Enumerated. The following acts, among others, are declared to be loud, disturbing and unnecessary noises in violation of this section, but such enumeration shall not be deemed to be exclusive:

(2) Radios, phonographs, etc. The using, operating or permitting to be played, used or operated any radio receiving set, musical instrument, television set, phonograph or other machine or device for the producing or reproducing of sound in such manner as to disturb the peace, quiet and comfort of the neighboring inhabitants or at any time with louder volume than is necessary for convenient hearing for the person or persons who are in the room, vehicle or chamber in which such machine or device is operated and who are voluntary listeners thereto. The operation of any such set, instrument, phonograph, machine or device in such a manner as to be plainly audible at a distance of fifty feet from the building, structure or vehicle in which it is located shall be prima-facie evidence of a violation of this section.

(3) Loudspeakers, amplifiers for advertising. The using, operating or permitting to be played, used or operated of any radio receiving set, musical instrument, phonograph, loudspeaker, sound amplifier or other machine or device for the producing or reproducing of sound which is cast upon public streets for the purpose of commercial advertising or attracting the attention of the public to any building or structure;

(4) Yelling, shouting, etc. Yelling, shouting, hooting, whistling or singing on the public streets, particularly between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. of the following day or at any time or place so as to annoy or disturb the quiet, comfort or repose of persons in any office, or in any dwelling, hotel or other type of residence, or of any person in the vicinity;

(11) Drums. The use of any drum or other instrument or device for the purpose of attracting attention by creation of noise to any performance, show or sale;

(c) Exceptions. The provisions of this section shall not apply to the following:

(1) The emission of sound for the purpose of alerting persons to the existence of an emergency, or for the performance of urgent necessary work in the interest of public health and safety.

(2) For parades and special events, when a permit for such event has been issued by the Chief of Police, during the dates and times specified on the permit.

(3) Organized school-related programs, sporting events, and activities, or other public programs, activities, or events authorized by the Chief of Police or his designated representative.

Event Permit

The addition of this section is the result of concerns expressed last year at council meetings. Those concerns were about special events that had been granted a per-

mit. The concerns involved the frequency, length, and loudness of the event. These permits were also not know to people that resided in the area of the permit.

The goal of this section is to communicate what has been approved and the parameters of that approval.

We hope this process will allow businesses or organizations to have special events but in balance to the people that may live in areas that are affected.
