

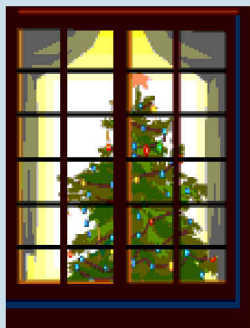

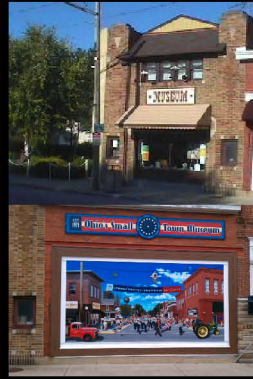
Congratulation to a New Eagle Scout Cole Nace

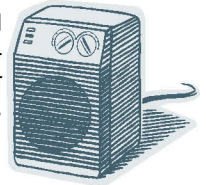

Seasonal Advice from the Village of Ashville Service Department



While the weather has been mild, we are preparing the village for winter. The goal of the service department is to maintain the safe flow of traffic. The crews work around the clock as needed for snow plowing and salt application. The snowplows will clean the streets from curb to curb. You can help the service department during sleet, hail, ice, and snow removal. This can only be done if cars are not parked along the curb. Please remove car(s) to an area that has been plowed. They can be returned once plowed.

Main and secondary roads are given first priority for plowing and salting to

assure emergency accessibility and to ease traffic congestion. Residential streets are plowed soon afterwards.

Primary Streets = Main, Long, Station, Circleville Ave., & SR 752

Secondary Streets = Jefferson, Miller, Scioto, Cromley, East, Powell, Randolph, Walnut, Plum and Park.

All Remaining Streets in Ashville

Snow Parking Ban - Parking is prohibited in Village Business District when snow has accumulated to a depth of two (2) inches. Signs are posted in these designated areas.

Property owners are responsible for snow and ice removal from sidewalks in front of their property. Depositing of snow or ice onto any public street or sidewalk is prohibited. Snow must be kept on the property it falls. Snow from your driveway may not be taken across the street. Also, please keep fire hydrants and storm sewer drains clear.

If you need the Service Department, call 983-6367 and ask for Dave Ballard our Services Superintendent. (We would like to call your attention to pot holes and ask you to call if you happen to see them, call 983-6367).



Police Beat October 2011

With hunting season in full swing, we would like to remind our residents how they may transport a firearm in their vehicles without getting into trouble with the law.

Section 2923.16C1 through 4 states that: No person shall knowingly transport or have a firearm in a motor vehicle, **unless** the person may lawfully possess that firearm under applicable law of this state or the United States, the firearm is unloaded, and the firearm is carried in one of the following ways:

- (1) In a closed package, box, or case;
- (2) In a compartment that can be reached only by leaving the vehicle;
- (3) In plain sight and secured in a rack or holder made for the purpose;
- (4) If the firearm is at least twenty-four inches in overall length as measured from the muzzle to the part of the stock furthest from the muzzle and if the barrel is at least eighteen inches in



length, either in plain sight with the action open or the weapon stripped, or, if the firearm is of a type on which the action will not stay open or which cannot easily be stripped, in plain sight.

Have a safe hunting season and good luck!
