## American Cancer Society

The American Cancer Society Relay for Life has become a signature event for Ashville and Pickaway County. It occurs at the Teays Valley High School Football Stadium. This event is a life-changing event that gives everyone in our community and across the globe a chance to celebrate the lives of people who have battled cancer, remember loved ones lost, and fight back against the disease. At Relay, teams of people camp out at the Teays Valley Stadium and take turns walking or running around the track. Each team is asked to have a representative on the track at all times during the event. Because cancer never sleeps our Relay is overnight.

Historically this event is important in defining our village and county as being a giving community of time, talent, and money. The funds generated are used for cancer patients and for research in an effort to alleviate a disease that touches everyone.

Relay for Life will be held on Saturday, June 2<sup>nd</sup>, from noon until 6:00 am on Sunday, June 3<sup>rd</sup>.

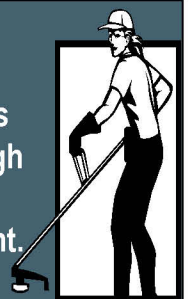

Early Head Start has an infant/toddler classroom located in Ashville that serves children ages 0 to 3 years. The full day program is open between the hours of 7:00 am to 6:00 pm, Monday through Friday. The classroom is staffed with two full time teachers and one classroom aide that care for eight infants and toddlers.
