Mayor Wise's State of the Village

I want to start out the 2012 Report by saying, it has been an honor to serve as Mayor and to be granted that opportunity. It has also been a pleasure to work with a council which included a new member, Jim Mathers.

In general these are the highlights for 2012:

Financial

The council and I put together the 2012 budget in a manner to anticipate future needs while using a conservative approach to that development. With the addition of grants and loans for some major projects, our revenue and expense budget is about 7.5 million dollars.

Cooperation

The village continues to seek collaboration with other local entities that would strengthen our ability to meet your needs. This entities include: Berger Hospital, Earnhardt Hill Water, Harrison Township Trustees, Madison Township Trustee, MORPC,

PICCA, Pickaway County Chamber of Commerce, Pickaway Progress Partnership (P³), and South Bloomfield. Our goal is to work with these entities on mutual issues of benefit.

Projects

The following are "Improvement Projects" that were begun earlier and continue into 2013: State Route 752 and Long Street Intersection, Griggs and Scioto Street Intersection, Griggs and West Station Street Railroad Crossing Relocation, and a new sewer facility with a new location.

Utility

As indicated above one of our major projects is to relocate and build a new sewer plant that will meet the village current and future needs. This project is based upon recommendation of the EPA and URS, a consultant hired last year. As part of this project consider how our need to replace our sewer plant can be done through the cooperative efforts with other entities.

Service

Paving and repaving costs have skyrocketed. The village is committed to make our streets as safe as possible but this is an increasing challenge for all municipalities. Review the aging equipment in the service department and see how we can economic replace that equipment. Continue stormwater management.

Police

Continue to protect our community and provide the police department the resources to accomplish that objective. We are working on continued drug and traffic enforcement. We are working on holding down the cost.

Planning and Zoning work includes signage and uniform enforcement of codes with the Police Department.



Police Beat 04-2013

Pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Sections 4511.204 and 4511.205, texting while driving is illegal in the State of Ohio.

According to the law, if a driver is under the age of 18 it is illegal to use any mobile communications device while driving. This means no texting, e-mailing, cell phone, video games, iPad/tablet or handheld GPS use while driving, even while sitting at a traffic light or in a traffic jam. Juvenile drivers face a \$150.00 fine and a 60 day suspension on a first offense and a \$300.00 fine and 1 year suspension on the second. For juveniles, this is a primary offense, which means law enforcement can stop a juvenile driver any time if the use of a mobile communications device is witnessed.

For adult drivers, texting and sending or reading e-mails is illegal. Adult drivers will face a \$150.00 fine for violation of the texting law. For adults, this is a secondary offense, which means law enforcement must have other probable cause to make a traffic stop (similar to a seat belt offense).

Exceptions to this law are pre-programmed GPS and emergency calls to police, fire, and EMS services.

We hope this process will allow businesses or organizations to have special events but in balance to the people that may live in areas that are affected.
