
The Mayor's Column—Summer Students




The Legislative Corner

- ◆ Resolution 12-2016 A Resolution Authorizing Supplemental Appropriations Between Accounts and Amending Ordinance 2016-05, the Permanent Appropriations Ordinance for the Village of Ashville, Ohio, and Declaring an Emergency.
- ◆ Ordinance 2016-07 An Ordinance Amending Ordinance 2014-04, 2015-04 and 929.02 (96-13, 2006-06, 2009-03, 2010-07) for a Debt Service Charge for The Wastewater Plant Expansion Project in Compliance with OhioEPA Findings and Orders for The Village of Ashville, and to Alter the Charge for Wastewater in the Village of Ashville. This Amended Ordinance Will Not Conflict with the Ohio Revised Code (ORC) Limitations and Declaring an Emergency.

When a full-time position opened up, he jumped at it. "I love the hometown feel," LeMaster said.


