ORDINANCE 2009 - 03

THIS IS AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE CHANGE IN UTILITY RATES IN THE VILLAGE OF ASHVILLE, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the Council of the Village of Ashville, Ohio authorizes by ordinance the rates charged for the refuse utility of the Village; and

WHEREAS, it becomes necessary on occasion to adjust those rates.

WHEREAS, the cost of providing utility services will be linked to the Consumer Price Index and will increase by that percentage at the conclusion of a year to be added on the next full-month.

WHEREAS, this rate increase will allow revenue to keep pace with expenses.

NOW, AND HEREAFTER BE IT ORDAINED BY THE VILLAGE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF ASHVILLE, PICKAWAY COUNTY, STATE OF OHIO THAT:

SECTION ONE

The rate structure for water and sewer charges found in Chapter 929. Water, Sewer, and Stormwater Rates will be adjusted annually based upon the Consumer Price Index.

SECTION TWO

This Utility Rate change will become effective during the first full month after the December Consumer Price Index is announced and annualized. That rate will be communicated to the residence before it becomes effective.

SECTION THREE

That this ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety of the Village and its inhabitants for the reason that there exists an imperative necessity for the earliest publication and distribution of rates authorized by this ordinance to the officials and residents of the Village, so as to facilitate administration, daily operation and avoid practical and legal entanglements, and shall go into full force and effect immediately upon its passage by Council.

The Mayor's Column 752 - VIKING

The traffic study at State Route 752 and Viking Way has been completed by ODOT. David Carlin from District 6 reported, "The traffic counts have been processed to determine if a signal is warranted at the SR-752/Lockbourne Eastern intersection. The counts and warrant analysis are attached to this email. This information shows that a traffic signal is not warranted at this intersection. From the feedback I have received on the current 4-way stop condition it is working well. I recommend that we meet again in three to six months to review any issues that may develop and determine how to move forward. Feel free to contact me if you would like to discuss this further."

We did discuss this intersection in our previous Volume 12 Issue 1 Newsletter. The complete message from Mr. Carlin, Traffic Study, Traffic Data, and ODOT Standards can be found on our website. We created a webpage to keep you informed.

Since ODOT has decided that the 4-way stop will remain, Ashville has requested that better signage be added. That request to ODOT included double stop signs, advance notification of the stop sign, and illuminated stop signs.

As reflected in our Vision Statement, we are committed on having an enhanced quality of life. That quality of life is certainly impacted by safe and efficient movement of traffic in or near the Village of Ashville. Any traffic accident at this

Consumer Price Index (CPI) Results in 1.5% Utility Increase

In 2009, Village Council passed an Ordinance that would allow for a method to keep the cost of operating utilities in line with the fees associated with that utility. Ordinance 2009-03 indicates that after December, the the Con-Index (CPI) is used to determine what is needed to maintain a rate schedule consistent with costs, that adjustment is based upon a December to December average. For 2009 the adjustment was 2.7%,

for 2011 that was 3.0%, and 2012 that was 1.7\$. The CPI for 2013 is a 1.5% increase. That percentage will be reflected in the next billing cycle. The impact of the rate change can be seen on the table to the right based upon a per 1000 gallons of usage. The Water Tower fee is not impacted by the Therefore, adjustment. A description of the CPI

Infiltration & Inflow (I & I)

A portion of the new total sewer fee will be set aside for I & I. That set aside amount will be 34¢ of the/thousand gallon wastewater fee. The result of that can be seen in the table to the right. Stormwater

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The impact of stormwater (surface water) is a function of the Service Department. The traditional view of stormwater is surface water runoff as a "service". Historically that is because the Service Department is responsible for keeping the storm drains clear which in turn kept streets drivable in a rain event.

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has taken on an increasing role in this area. The result of their emphasis seems to be concentrated in three categories.

First, how surface water drainage may affect bodies of water - ponds, creeks, and rivers. [Read More...]

Second, EPA concern about combined collection systems, sanitary and stormwater collected in one system, sometimes known as SSO. [Read More...]

Third, EPA concern about infiltration and inflow, also known as I & I. [Read More...]

Stormwater is billed by the village through the utility department.
