**The Mayor's Column - Railroad Crossing Relocation from Griggs to W. Station St.**



While we are still in the middle of winter, I would like to highlight some major projects that are underway in Ashville. The first project is the St.Rt. 752 & Long Street Intersection Improvement Project. It has taken some time to bring this project to the construction phase. Before that construction phase can be started South Central, Frontier, and Columbia Gas will relocate their services. Decker Construction was selected to do the construction work which includes new traffic signals, pedestrian cross walks, and center left turn lanes.

Decker Construction will begin work in late March. The goal is to have all construction completed by mid June.


The logo above is designed for this project. Like all Ashville Projects they will have a construction webpage to follow and inform you about what is or will be occurring.

The second project involves the relocation of the railroad crossing from Griggs to West Station Street. We were able to secure five different funding sources to relocate this crossing. The partners to this railroad crossing improvement project include:

- ◆ The Ohio Public Works Commission (OPWC), represented by, Linda Bailiff, Abbey DeHart, Michael Miller, and Susan Spiker.
- ◆ The Ohio Rail Development Commission (ORDC), represented by, Matthew Dietrich, Susan Kirkland, Joe Reinhardt, and Jill Henry
- ◆ Norfolk Southern, represented by, Bill Barringer, Casey Talbott, and Cayela Wimberly.
- ◆ Ashville represented by the Mayor, Village Council, Village Staff, and Christopher Tebbe.

Norfolk Southern has already begun work on north bound spur and we hope to have the roadway improvement completed sometime in the spring.



A third project involving wastewater utilities is underway. By the time you read this article we should have closed on the property.

The final design will be completed for this facility in 2014. Once the design is completed the Village of Ashville will solicit for construction bids. Construction may begin in late 2014 or sometime in 2015.

We also have a CDBG Project pending with Pickaway County. It involves roadway improvements on Hedges, Poplar, Hall and South Street. Once that is confirmed a tracking webpage will be created.

**Refuse Rate Changes for 2014**

For residential refuse removal the monthly charge will increase 63¢. The other containers are increasing an average of 4.4%. To cover the processing cost the administration fee is 6%. This fee used to be 15% and 10%. We have been working to reduce that fee.

The police department has already asked children to stay off of the ice on ponds in the village. Please help us to insure a safe winter and make sure our children stay off the ice.
