The Mayor's Column—Recycle/Refuse

At the end of September Ashville concluded an agreement to join Consortium III. This Consortium includes Grove City, Jackson Township, and Urbancrest. The reason we did this is to obtain a good price for recycling and refuse services for the longest time possible. This agreement ends on December 31, 2021. It provides for the following pricing through that time:

picture below provides a good representation of what will occur in Ashville in 2018. First, LWS will provide a red 65 Gallon Recycle Container and a gray 96 Gallon Refuse Container. You can use your existing green Recycle Bin for internal collection of Recycle material.

We have included with the newsletter an insert that could be attached to your refrigerator. It indicates what can be recycled. Many times it is just cleaning an item to become usable for recycling. The gray container contains the balance of the refuse which includes yard waste.

Instructions to Voters

- To vote: completely darken the oval (●) to the left of your choice.
- Note the permitted number of choices directly below the title of each candidate office. Do not mark the ballot for more choices than allowed. Voter either "yes" or "No" or "For" or "Against," on any issue.
- If you mark the ballot for more choices than permitted, that contest or question will not be counted.
- To vote for a write-in candidate: completely darken the oval (●) to the left of the blank line and write in the candidate's name. Only votes cast for candidates who filed as write-in candidates can be counted.
- Do not write in a candidate's name if that person's name is already printed on the ballot for that same contest.
- If you make a mistake or want to change your vote: return your ballot to an election official and get a new ballot. You may ask for a new ballot up to two times.
- Use a black pen.

Issue 1
Rights for Crime Victims
Proposed Constitutional Amendment
Proposed by Initiative Petition
To repeal and replace the existing language in Section 10a of Article I of the Constitution of the State of Ohio

A majority yes vote is necessary for the amendment to pass.

The proposed amendment would expand the rights of victims under the current Section 10a and require that the rights of victims be protected as vigorously as the rights of the accused. More specifically, for the purpose of ensuring due process, respect, fairness, and justice for crime victims and their families in the criminal and juvenile justice systems, the amendment would provide victims with:

- the right to privacy and to be treated with respect, fairness, and dignity;
- the right to information about the rights and services available to crime victims;
- the right to notification in a timely manner of all proceedings in the case;
- the right to be present and heard at all court proceedings, including the right to petition the court to protect the victim's rights;
- the right to a prompt conclusion of the case;
- to refuse discovery requests made by the accused, except as authorized by Article I, Section 10 of the Ohio constitution;
- the right to reasonable protection from the accused;
- the right to notice of the release or escape of the accused; and
- the right to restitution.

The proposed amendment would not establish a cause of action for damages or compensation against the state or any political subdivision.

If approved, the amendment will be effective 90 days after the election.

Issue 2
To require state agencies to not pay more for prescription drugs than the federal Department of Veterans Affairs and require state payment of attorney fees and expenses to specific individuals for defense of the law

Proposed Law
Proposed by Initiative Petition
To enact Chapter 194 of the Ohio Revised Code

A majority yes vote is necessary for the law to pass.

To enact Chapter 194 of the Ohio Revised Code, which would:

- Require the State of Ohio, including its state departments, agencies and entities, to not pay more for prescription drugs than the price paid by the United States Department of Veterans Affairs.
- Establish that the individual petitioners responsible for proposing the law have a direct and personal stake in defending the law; require the State to pay petitioners' reasonable attorney fees and other expenses; require the petitioners to pay \$10,000 to the State if the law is held by a court to be unenforceable and limit petitioners' personal liability to that amount; and require the Attorney General to defend the law if challenged in court.

Proposed Tax Levy (Additional)
Pickaway County Park District

A majority affirmative vote is necessary for passage.

An additional tax for the benefit of Pickaway County Park District for the purpose of parks and recreation, more specifically to provide funds to assist with maintaining existing facilities, and provide additional funds to expand and develop "new" trails and parks throughout Pickaway County, and to assist cities, villages and townships within Pickaway County with improvements to their parks and trails at a rate not exceeding one-half (0.5) mill for each one dollar of valuation, which amounts to five cents (\$0.05) for each one hundred dollars of valuation, for ten (10) years, commencing in 2017, first due in calendar year 2018.

Plastic Materials (Acceptable)

- Plastic Containers / Plastic Bottles # 1-7: Milk Jugs, Soda Bottles, Laundry Detergent Bottles, Water Bottles, Shampoo Bottles, Contact Solution Bottles, Etc. – The base of the container must be wider than the mouth of the container.



Metal Materials (Acceptable)

- Aluminum Cans: Clean Beverage and Food Cans, Etc.
- Steel Cans: Clean Soup, Food, and Aerosol Cans, Etc.



Paper Materials (Acceptable)

- White Ledger Papers: Computer, Copy Machine, Typewriter Paper, White Ledger Pads, Machine Tape
- News Quality Papers: Newspaper, Phonebooks, Wide-lined Newsprint
- Folders: Manila, Colored and Coated Folders
- Mail: Letters, Brochures, Advertisements, Magazine
- Correspondence: Legal Pad Paper, Colored Paper, Message Sheets, Self-Adhesive Notes, Index Cards



- Envelopes: Window Envelopes, Non-Window Envelopes, With or Without Labels, Colored, Coated
- Brown Papers: Brown Grocery Bags, Cereal Boxes, Beverage Carrier Boxes, Clean Pizza Boxes
- Cardboard Boxes: Broken down into 3 ft. x 3 ft. sections



Glass Materials (Acceptable)

- Clear or Colored Glass Bottles and Jars – Please rinse and remove lids.

Paper Materials (Un-Acceptable)



- Text Books → Glue binding contaminates paper
- Candy Wrappers – Candy and sugars contaminate paper
- DIRTY Plates, Cups and Napkins – Food contaminates paper
- Facial Tissue and Paper Towels – Use of material contaminates paper



Plastic Materials (Un-Acceptable)

- Plastic Bags: Grocery Bags, Etc. Please return grocery bags to store
- Butter Tubs or Whipped Topping Tubs (Food contaminates materials)
- Plastic Plates, Cups, Utensils, Food Trays, Etc. (Food contaminates materials)



Metal Materials (Un-Acceptable)

- Scrap Metal, Pots and Pans, Coat Hangers, Paint Cans, Etc.



Glass Materials (Un-Acceptable)

- Window Glass, Drinking Glasses, Fish Tanks, Light Bulbs, Etc.



Yard Waste (Un-Acceptable)

- Yard clippings, leaves, cut-up limbs and branches
